Thope the summer was restful and enjoyable for you and your family. Our summer was full of preparation for the year ahead, and we have great things in store for our students and families.

Since school let out in June, two hundred Niles teachers, administrators, and staff participated in professional development sessions to expand their instructional knowledge and capacity. Opportunities to improve literacy skills, advanced placement (AP) training, and writing common assessments were just some of the session topics. Many staff and parents also served on hiring committees in an effort to recruit and hire our new energetic and quality administrators and teachers. We never lost focus on the needs of our students as we continued our partnership

with Chartwells, the YMCA and other organizations to help students keep up with their learning throughout the summer. Our high school students were able to catch up on credits during two academic sessions, where many took advantage of the time and individualized assistance provided. Though the majority of the work is hidden behind the walls and above the ceilings, the exterior of the buildings and the new and refreshed learning environments look spectacular. We could not have done it without the support of the community!

This upcoming school year is set to be another great one for our remarkable and talented students. Awards, recognitions, and scholarships continuously poured in last year and I believe those

who come out and support our teams, clubs, and organizations this year will be just as amazed. NILES EXTENDED SCHOOL COMMUNITY

community (NESC) is rolling out its eighth year of course offerings. NESC is a choice Niles Community Schools offers to district students as a resource for elective courses. These classes are offered virtually and have the ability to incorporte in-person instruction with a community expert.

How do the courses work?

The student selects a virtual course from our current list of Board approved options. If the student wants to take advantage of the optional community expert portion, they register for that component as well.

For example, "The Keyboard" is one of our current options. This virtual course includes 18 modules in a virtual learning management system called Canvas. Students must complete a minimum of eighty percent of the online assignments. The student then has the opportunity to set up a weekly lesson with a community piano instructor. All instructors are vetted and fingerprint checked. Sessions are arranged to accommodate the student's personal schedule. Students must attend at least

eighty percent of the sessions arranged. Transportation to lessons must be provided by the student's parent or guardian. If the student is 10 years old or younger, the parents must remain onsite during course time with the community expert. The virtual portion of the course is structured to accomodate the student's existing

What kind of credit will I earn?

These electives receive a credit/ no credit grade. The goal of these courses is for the student to master new skills. Each student begins at a different level of expertise. These courses are designed to advance a student beyond the skill level at which they begin the course. A final project is required to demonstrate that mastery.

Who can choose these courses?

Any student enrolled at Niles Community Schools may select these courses for one or more of their electives.

Where do I find a list of courses?

A course list is posted on *nileshsp.com*. Click on the "Courses" tab to view current course options.

How do I enroll in one of these courses?

If you are a full-time student, contact your school principal for details.



DEVELOPING A FOUNDATION FOR A SUCCESSFUL YEAR

ing Lardner Middle School is gearing up for another year of great success! Each fall, we begin a new endeavor to best meet the educational needs of our students so that they are prepared for an ever-changing world. Over the years, there have been many changes in the way we educate students. Instructional methods and the way students demonstrate content mastery are very different today compared to years ago. Still, one element remains unchanged, year in and year out, at Ring Lardner Middle School: the practice of culture-building and promoting positive relationships. The reason for this is simple—it works! We dedicate time during the first few weeks of school to purposefully build culture and promote positive relationships, and this has proven very effective in helping us meet the unique social, emotional, and academic needs of our students.

Middle school can seem like a large and intimidating place for students transitioning from our elementary buildings. Beginning of the year teambuilding activities go a long way towards helping students feel they belong. Our staff's commitment to fostering positive relationships among teams helps this process work. Please know that all of us take our responsibilities very seriously. We know developing trusting relationships is to helping students navigate the difficult waters that middle school can sometimes involve.

In addition to culture and relationship building, Ring Lardner is in the process of implementing a PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support) system. PBIS is a proactive, multi-tiered problem-solving model designed to prevent inappropriate behavior through teaching and reinforcing appropriate behaviors. The PBIS model is designed to offer a range of preventive strategies and interventions that are implemented with students based on their needs. It also addresses the role of the environment in the development and improvement of behavior problems. Our PBIS model has been developed around Niles Community Schools' 3Rs: Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Resilient. Please ask your students what they have done to exhibit these traits each day. Lastly, in order to meet each

students' unique academic

needs, Ring Lardner will be implementing a 40 minute intervention block daily. During this block, students will receive academic support and/or enrichment in either language arts or mathematics. Through Delta Math assessments and Benchmark assessments in literacy, students will be grouped to focus on individual needs. In doing so, we hope to fill any learning gaps students may have and put them in the best position possible when they begin high school.

We are very excited about the traditions and new initiatives that are taking place at Ring Lardner this school year. Our goal is to make this the best year—socially, emotionally, and academically—for all of our students. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any questions.


his fall, Howard-Ellis is excited to welcome several new staff members.

FERPA ANNUAL NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS AND DESIGNATION OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Notice of Rights • The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA") affords parents, students over 18 years of age ("eligible students"), and parents of dependent students certain rights with respect to education records. Those rights include the following:

1. Right to Inspect: A parent or eligible student has the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the district within 45 days of the district's receipt of a written request for access.

A parent or eligible student should submit to the school principal a written request that clearly identifies the record(s) he/she wishes to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student, in writing, of the time and place where the student's records may be inspected.

2. Right to Request Amendment: A parent or eligible student has the right to request the amendment of the student's education record(s) that are believed to be inaccurate or misleading.

A parent or eligible student may submit a written request for amendment to the school principal. This request should clearly identify the part of the record that the parent or eligible student wants changed and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.

If the record is not amended as requested, the district shall notify the parent or eligible student of the decision in writing and shall advise him/her of his/her right to a hearing on the request for amendment. Additional information on the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. Right to Consent to Disclosure: A parent or eligible student has the right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education record, except to the extent the FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the district in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position, including law enforcement unit personnel and health staff, a person or company with whom the district has contracted to perform a special task, such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant or therapist; a person serving on the school board; or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his/her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if he/she needs to review an education record to fulfill his/her professional responsibilities.

Upon request, the district discloses education records without consent to officials of other schools in which students seek or intend to enroll. Disclosure without consent may be made in case of emergency as determined by the district or to report crimes occurring at school or involving the school or its personnel.

4. Right to Complain: A parent or eligible student has the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the district to comply with FERPA requirements. Complaints should be directed to:

Each year the Superintendent shall provide public notice to students and their parents of the District's intent

B. Directory Information

to make available upon request, certain information known as "directory information." The Board designates as student directory information:

A student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, height (if member of an athletic team), weight (if member of an athletic team which requires disclosure to participate), dates

of attendance, date of graduation, honors, and awards received, honor rolls, school photographs or videos of students participating in school activities, events, or programs, grade level, the most recent previous school attended, degrees, and email address.

The Board designates schoolassigned email accounts as "directory information" for the limited purpose of facilitating students' registration for access to various online educational services, including mobile applications/apps that will be utilized by the student for educational purposes and for inclusion in internal email address books. School-assigned email accounts shall not be released as directory information beyond this/ these limited purpose(s) and to any person or entity but the specific online educational service provider and internal users of the District's Education Technology.

The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Niles Community School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Directory uses may include: A playbill showing your student's role in a drama production, annual yearbook, honor roll or other recognition lists, graduation programs, sports activity sheets, approved vendors, military recruiters, media publications, request for records, official transcripts, and career inventories or surveys.

Unless a parent or eligible student advises the district in within 20 school days after receipt of the District's public notice that he/she does not want some or all of this designated directory information released, school officials may release this information without prior consent. Written objections to the release of directory information should be submitted to the building principal of your school.

Niles Community School District displays student artwork and other assignments on bulletin boards in the classroom, in the hallways of the school and at the Administration Building. Niles Community Schools may also display student work in areas frequented by the general public, such as shopping areas. Student work may also be reproduced in school

publications or posted to school media/web sites. If a parent or eligible student does not wish to have the student's work displayed, the district must be notified in within 20 school days after receipt of the District's public notice.

C. Military Recruiting Representatives

The Board shall provide United States Armed Forces Recruiters with at least the same access to the high school campus and to student directory information (names, addresses, and telephone listings of secondary students) as is provided to other entities offering educational or employment opportunities to those students. "Armed forces of the United States" means the armed forces of the United States and their reserve components and the United States Coast Guard.

If a student or the parent or legal guardian of a student submits a signed, written request to the Board that indicates that the student or the parent or legal guardian does not want the student's directory information to be accessible to official recruiting representatives, then the officials of the school shall not allow that access to the student's directory information. Written objections to the release of the directory information should be submitted to the building principal of your school.
