We had our opportunity to help as well. When the Wortham family needed a venue for their inaugural free Thanksgiving luncheon, which was open to senior citizens, the financially struggling and those without a family to eat with, we were excited to offer to host the event at Niles High School. The Wortham family and many community volunteers served nearly 100 meals on Thanksgiving.

Our students are also giving back, and are going above and beyond with their fundraising and community service efforts. In addition to raking leaves and student sponsored donation drives, our annual Pink Week was held in October, which is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and included bake sales, special wristbands and

a school-wide walk. The week concluded with our Pink Out football game. It was great to see all the support for breast cancer awareness, with our football team in special pink jerseys, cheerleaders with pink bows and pompoms, and the crowd wearing pink. 


Mrs. Duis's class cooked French toast and noodles to celebrate the class working on the letter "f" and "n". The students enjoyed making the food and eating with their friends.

## NEWS FROM NILES NEW TECH

NILES COMMUNITY SCHOOLS NEWSLETTER

ver the past few weeks, a good number of partners (local organizations, businesses, and community leaders) have joined us at Niles New Tech to hear our learners present their marketing plans and branding ideas. Our learners have also ventured out to area organizations to share their research and present their findings on a variety of topics. Specifically, in our Health Marketing class, learners developed marketing resources for the Children's Advocacy Center which included brochures, posters, and commercials. In BioChem, learners traveled to the YMCA to showcase their research on how exercise and illness impact the body's balance.

At Niles New Tech, we believe our learners have something important to say and we provide them with the venue to do so. However, before they ever meet with a partner, a good deal of "up front" work takes place. This "up front" work is what we refer to as scaffolding which consists of teaching the skills needed to confidently and accurately communicate ideas to a partner. There is no guess-

work; these skills are outlined on project specific rubrics which express exactly what a good presentation in the given venue looks like. These skills may include: how to use eye contact, projection, gestures, word choice, and appropriate dress to engage and inform an audience; how to display ideas in a logical order; how to use compelling and convincing media elements that are appropriate to the task. All these skills are first taught, then practiced, and eventually used with the partners. After all, school is not a place to learn solely content; it is a place to learn the skills needed to be successful in college and ultimately a career.

Learners understand the benefits and advantages of learning how to present. Allison Cox, a New Tech sophomore believes, "Niles New Tech has offered me great opportunities to grow and learn how to be flexible in many different situations. I used to be a very quiet kid that found socializing with anyone a hassle, but with the PBL program I've learned how to communicate effectively with my peers and respected adults."

Jordan Edwards, another Niles New Tech sophomore concurred.

"I am able to talk in front of people and not be nervous. The reason for this is we have business partners we present to and I have been taught how to be confident while presenting," he said.

Learning how to present is one of the skills we want all our graduates to leave New Tech with. Knowing the content is important. Having the skills to express the content and speak with confidence and conviction are equally important.


